

When we reached the port of Dover our coach trip continued. But a few hours and one big sight later ...







On the 20th of May 2012 the Olympic torch came to Exeter. We saw the torch under a old bridge that was a fantastical experience.




Freetime Activities in Exeter




The trip to Plymouth

Plymouth is a city and unitary authority area on the south coast of Devon, England, about 190 miles (310km) south-west of London. It is situated between the mouths of the rivers Plum to the east and Tamar to the west, where they join Plymouth Sound. Since 1967, the City of Plymouth has included the suburbs of Plympton and Plymstock, which are on the east side of the River Plym.

Plymouth's history goes back to the Bronze Age, when its first settlement grew at Mount Batten. This settlement continued to grow as a trading post for the Roman Empire, until the more prosperous village of Sutton, the current Plymouth, surpassed it. In 1620, the Pilgrim Fathers left Plymouth for the New World and established Plymouth Colony – the second English settlement in what is now the United States of America. During the English Civil War the town was held by the Parliamentarians and was besieged between 1642 and 1646.

Throughout the Industrial Revolution, Plymouth grew as a major commercial shipping port, handling imports and passengers from the Americas, while the neighbouring town of Devonport grew as an important Royal Naval shipbuilding and dockyard town. The new, merged town took the name of Plymouth which, in 1928, achieved city status. The city's naval importance later led to its targeting and partial destruction during World War II, an act known as the Plymouth Blitz. After the war the city centre was completely rebuilt.

Another highlight during our internship was the trip to London. We booked a hostel for two nights it was a unisex room for eight persons. We visited the Tower Bridge, the Tower of London, Westminster Abbey, the Parliament, the Big Ben, the London Eye, the Hyde Park and the St. James Park.
